Clark County Home Rule Charter

Training and Q&A for interested Freeholders

To learn more about "Home Rule" charter, the Clark County Commissioners have asked their staff to provide training sessions at various locations across the county. County staff are doing a great job with the training. If you have not yet attended a training session, the following opportunities still exist.

- 4/7/11 Camas Library, Rooms A & B -- 625 NE Fourth Avenue

To evaluate interest in potential Home Rule Charter provisions, county staff issued 5 five paper votes for each attendee and collected them towards the end of the training. Below is the summary of the voting which occurred.

Feb 10th 36 Attendees 161 votes cast

- 21.2% Citizen's Initiative Process
- 19.9% Funding Mechanism in place before approval
- 15.5% Citizen's Referendum Process
 - 9.9% Electing Commissioners by District
 - 9.3% Term Limits
 - 7.5% Change partisan races to non-partisan
 - 6.8% Include Charter Review Process
 - 5.0% Increase commissioners from three to five

March 24th 21 Attendees 95 votes cast

- 21.1 % Funding Mechanism in place before approval
- 16.8% Citizen's Initiative
- 15.8% Electing Commissioners by District
- 15.8% Citizen's Referendum
- 11.6% Change partisan races to non-partisan
 - 7.4% Increase commissioners from three to five
 - 5.3% Term Limits
 - 5.3% Include Charter Review Process

On March 17, 2011, Mayor Tim Leavitt with accompanying guests, spoke to Clark County residents regarding the impending Columbia River Crossing. The townhall style meeting was hosted by We The People of Vancouver.

Mayor Leavitt, Thayer Rorabaugh and Dean Lookingbill, recounted the history of the project. The project investigation began in 1999. In 2001-2002 a task force of 26 members were appointed by the governor to develop recommendations for traffic and freight management in the 1-5 corridor. Over the next 8 years additional committees, task forces, and departments came together to study and create the present plan for the highway.

This detailed history, which also included cost break down from federal, state and local coffers, as well as future anticipated expenditures through public elections and transit maintenance irritated the audience. A major concern was the funding for this project. They felt too many taxpayer dollars had already been spent and the project really hadn't begun. The total project is slated to cost \$3.550 billion. The highway portion alone will cost \$2.700 billion. It will be funded from three sources \$400 million from the federal government, \$1.0 billion from the state, \$1.300 billion from regional/local funds.

The question quickly arose "What were regional funds?" The answer was tolls, or local taxes. The people were not pleased with that answer. From their point of view Federal dollars were once their dollars, but taxes took them. Same with state. Now they were asked to pay for the privilege to cross the bridge their taxes built.

When Mayor Leavitt explained that if Clark County didn't take the federal money someone else would get it, he received a resounding chorus of "Let it go." One participant asked Mayor Leavitt why he was supporting the project especially when local votes were strongly against it. He explained that he hears from others who support the bridge, especially for commerce and freight, but said he would be willing to discuss other opinions.

Though a meeting of this magnitude could have gotten out of hand, it did not. Though there were passions on the part of the citizens, they and Mayor Leavitt dialogued considerably well. Afterward Mayor Leavitt, Mr. Rorabaugh and Mr. Lookingbill remained to speak one on one with many people. Mayer Leavitt agreed to take their suggestions into consideration.

Standing in the Gaps

Founder of George Wythe University Oliver DeMille recently blogged the following: "If our thoughts about our government are mostly negative, we need to change our attitude and get involved in making it a government we can be proud of. The United States really is a government of, by and for the people--but that means we have to do our part. We have to own it."

At a We the People meeting earlier this year, a significant amount of meeting attendees expressed the sentiment that much of the civic problems we face today (associated with progressivism) are a direct result from the lack of conservative leadership and civic participation over the decades.

Each of us stands or falls according to the set of beliefs we hold. If as DeMille pointed out we mainly host negative beliefs about the government then we will likely isolate ourselves from government and by extension abdicate our own personal ownership role. But if we hold that government can be a force for good as well as for evil, then we owe it to ourselves and each other to seek to make it so for the sake of good.

Between this year and next there are likely over 100 offices to be filled from local school boards to the U.S. president.
